**Another New Information Portal Hits the Streets**

A new website giving detailed information on local crime levels and trends, which can be easily accessed by the public, was launched 19 September 2007.

**www.myneighbourhood.info** is a unique online crime mapping system giving detailed information on a range of crime, which is broken down to neighbourhood level based on a postcode search. The new site means that members of the public can get up-to-date information on a wide variety of crime categories including: house burglary, criminal damage, wounding, robbery, theft of and from vehicles, theft from the person and common assault. They can then find out whether crime levels are increasing or decreasing in their area and see how their neighbourhood compares to the force average and with different local authorities.

The data is uploaded on a monthly basis direct from police recording databases.

Police forces across the West Midlands have recorded a rise in house burglaries where flat screen TV's have been stolen. Three have occurred in the Walsall area during the past week. Two vehicles have been seen at several of the burglaries, the first being a silver Mercedes SLK on false number plates. The other vehicle involved is a white Ford Transit van, part registration taken as WL05, however this may now have been changed. If you see any such vehicles in your locality, particularly in suspicious circumstances, contact the police immediately.

Please note that homes where flat screen TV's are visible through front windows are particularly vulnerable. It is advised that TV's are moved to a position where they are not easily visible from the front of the house, or that blinds or curtains are used.

**Local Robbery**

At approx. 2000hrs on Thursday 20 Sept, a Silver BMW was stolen in Mellish Road. The victim had advertised his vehicle in Autotrader. Two men turned up for a test drive.

Whilst out driving the men asked if they could try it on their own and pushed the victim out of the vehicle.

They then drove off. The offenders vehicle, a VW Golf - no registration, was parked at the IP's address and was collected by one of the offenders later.

Offender 1 described as white, approx. 24yrs old, slim build, short black hair, brown eyes, used the name of 'Kevin'.

Offender 2 described as white, mid 20's, 5'10.

'Kevin' gave a mobile number but checks on this show no trace.

This is the second such vehicle theft in recent weeks. Please advise members who are selling vehicles in this way to exercise caution when taking potential buyers for test drives.





## Top marks for schools project

The innovative schools project by North Aldridge NHW has chalked up top marks with the judges of the UK Neighbourhood Watch Trust Group of the Month competition.

North Aldridge Neighbourhood Watch secretary Tony Marshall is the driving force behind the 'Safety In The Community' pilot scheme, run for nine and ten-year-olds at their local junior school.

It proved such a success that Tony and his team of Watch volunteers and police community support officers have been invited back to the school next year. Now Tony is working on plans to introduce his classroom crime workshops to more schools in Walsall, Birmingham - and hopefully across the country.

Tony said: "We really had fun and the children have loved finding out how they can reduce local crime. We have had great support from the school, and comments from parents and children are very positive."

During the four weeks the children learnt how to protect their bikes, mark mobile phones, what to do in an emergency and how important it is to be aware of things going on around them when they are out playing.

A lot of thought went into preparing for each of the workshops with the accent on creating a series of fun activities - to put across a serious message.

"It's been a wonderful example of team work between Neighbourhood Watch, Neighbourhood Policing and the community," said Tony.

## Crime News

We stated in our introduction to this newsletter that crime in our area had remained low for 2007. The last half of the year crime reports reflect this and here are some of the examples of the crime that has occurred from April 2007.

In April two attempt burglaries occurred in *Broadmeadow* and *Lazyhill Road* and car parts were stolen from a car in *Kingshayes Road*. Please always take care with notices pushed through the door offering to carry out work for you, it may be innocent but it can lead to problems in the long term. Always be satisfied that the person/s you are dealing with are credible.

May records a scooter and Go cart stolen from *Hobs Hole Lane* and nearby in Pelsall and Shelfield distraction burglaries occurred, always something we have to lookout for. Cars were stolen from *Hill Top Walk* and *Walsall Wood Road* and we experienced some anti-social behaviour off *Lazyhill Road*. A break-in occurred in *Leighswood Road* and finally a couple of thefts from vehicles in the area. Most surly an attempt to gain access to property left on display in the car.

June started with a burglary in *Malvern Drive* and continued with the same in *Leighswood Avenue*, *Walsall Wood Road* and *Rutland Crescent*. Finally, we noted bogus callers had now moved to Streetly area.

July noted a burglary in *Pavilion Close* and damage to cars in *Headborough Walk* area with theft from cars in *Walsall Wood Road* and *Kingshayes Road*. It seems like the distraction burglars have now moved to Calderfields area.

August was a month of little crime for our area and we moved into September with car crime affecting *Bankside Way*, *Lazyhill Road* and *Jordan Way*. October however, saw one of the most distressing of crime activity in North Aldridge when a person with a knife wanted money from a lorry driver that had stopped in *Walsall Wood Road*. *Lancaster Ave* suffered with a theft from a car and it seems as if *Broadmeadow* was targeted by the same thief when a Rover, Vauxhall, Ford and Subaru all had attempts to break into the car.. In *Sussex Avenue* they succeeded in stealing the car.

October was by far the worst crime month in so far as Anti social behaviour was reported adjacent to *Lazyhill* shops and *Dance City*. Please do not forget to report any activity, you never know who it may help. Finally, *Jessie Rd* had a car searched by offenders, *Burnfields Rd* had a car broken into and CD's stolen, *Woodend Way* had a Ford Fiesta stolen and *Hillview* had a parcel stolen from a residents porch. We can all see the increase in car crime levels starting to appear this month and this trend continues into November.

*Rutland Crescent*, *Herbert Rd* and *Walsall Wood Rd* all had car or van crime reported and lastly property was stolen from a house in *Stonnal Road*.

It is clear that during this period of reporting, car crime features as the most predominant crime. We all need to be careful at attracting thieves and burglars to our area. I still see residents, even neighbours with sat navs clearly on display inside the car. The residents are totally oblivious to the invitation that they give to thieves and totally unsympathetic to crime behaviour. The obvious display affects all the residents in the street as the thief would wish to carry out as many quick hits in the area as they can and then get out. My car, my house all become vulnerable by the stupidity of some inconsiderate people who choose to display their wares to all.

Please remember, it is a Neighbourhood Watch and we should all try hard to make it work.



### Nuisance and Abandoned Vehicles

Abandoned vehicles often get confused with nuisance vehicles. An abandoned vehicle is always a nuisance, but a nuisance vehicle is not always abandoned. A nuisance vehicle could be any of the following:

- Poorly parked;
- Causing an obstruction;
- Involved in residential parking disputes;
- Broken down.

#### **What is an abandoned vehicle?**

Any vehicle that appears not to be in regular use and is not displaying a valid road tax disc will be regarded as abandoned unless it is being kept on private land with the landowners or occupiers permission.

Some other reasons for vehicles being abandoned are:

- High cost of running the vehicle;
- MOT failure;
- Death of the owner;
- Owner in prison;
- Owner suffering ill health;
- Long-term residency outside the UK.

#### **How can you tell if a vehicle is abandoned?**

It is not always easy to know if a vehicle is abandoned but the following points should allow a reasoned judgement to be made:

- Is the vehicle taxed? (This should not be the sole consideration)
- Are the tyres flat?
- Is there any litter, weeds, etc under the vehicle indicating that it has not been moved for some time
- Are the brake discs rusty?
- Is the windscreen or any of the windows broken?
- Is mould present on either the inside or the outside of the vehicle?
- Does the vehicle contain items of waste, for example tyres?
- Does the vehicle have a number plate?

**What are the problems caused by abandoned vehicles?**

There are various problems caused by abandoned vehicles including:

- Negative effect on local environmental quality;
- Risk of explosion and injury;
- Leaking dangerous fluids;
- Attracting vandalism;
- Vehicles can be the result of, or lead to a crime;

**Abandoned vehicles are often filled with rubbish.**

**What happens next?**

An enforcement officer will visit the location within 1 working day of notification. If the vehicle is of low value, a 24 hour notice will be attached to the vehicle, which if unclaimed will be removed.

If the vehicle is on private land, a 15 day notice will be served on the owner or occupier of the land.

If the vehicle is of value and therefore should not be destroyed the vehicle may be taken in to storage and a 7 day notice served on the registered keeper. No notices will be put on the vehicle.

**How do I report an abandoned vehicle?**

You can report an abandoned vehicle using the Walsall Borough "Abandoned Car Report" form WBCT 100 available from North Aldridge Committee. The completed form can then be sent to the "Streetpride" department of Walsall Council via e-mail. This option will allow North Aldridge to keep a record on file.

You do not need the abandoned car report form to always report an abandoned vehicle as you can also call the Streetpride Department by telephone on 01922 653344 having the following information available (or as much as possible).

- Exact location of vehicle
- Make and model of vehicle
- Colour
- Registration Number
- Whether taxed or not and the condition of the vehicle

**Be aware of scams**

**With Christmas fast approaching we thought it better to notify residents of scams that seem to be advertised and have been confirmed by Royal Mail.**

**The Trading Standards Office are making people aware of the following scam: A card is posted through your door from a company called PDS (Parcel Delivery Service) suggesting that they were unable to deliver a parcel and that you need to contact them on 0906 6611911 (a premium rate number).**

**DO NOT call this number as this is a mail scam originating from Belize. If you call the number and you start to hear a recorded message you will already have been billed £15 for the phone call. If you do receive a card with these details, then please contact Royal Mail Fraud on 02072396655 or ICSTIS (the premium rate service regulator) at [www.icstis.org.uk](http://www.icstis.org.uk) "**

**You need to be wary about variants of this scam because although this one may be out of date, rest assured others may find a way of copying.**

### Police stats show reduction in violent crime

Despite a year of high profile shootings and gang terror, latest police figures show violent crime and gun crime is DOWN. In the year to June 2007, there was a six per cent decrease in firearms offences according to provisional police statistics, bringing the annual total down to 9,712.

Serious and slight injuries from firearms fell by 11 and seven per cent, respectively. Worryingly, however, firearms offences resulting in fatalities increased from 53 to 56.

There were nearly 21,000 fewer violent crimes recorded by police in the quarter from April to June 2007 compared with the same period in 2006.

A full update on gun crime and homicide statistics is due to be published in January. Published at the same time as the police recorded crime statistics, the British Crime Survey (BCS) provides what is regarded as a more complete picture of crime trends in the UK.

The British Crime Survey has a consistent methodology and is unaffected by changes in levels of reporting to the police, recording practice or police activity. In the year to June 2007, results from the BCS showed overall levels of anti-social behaviour and worry of crime to be stable compared with the previous year, but public confidence in the criminal justice system has fallen.

### **Crime boffins pinpoint burglary hotspots**

New technology could see police keep a step ahead of burglars by accurately predicting where the next spate of break-ins is most likely to happen.

A six month trial of new computer mapping techniques by experts from the Jill Dando Institute of Crime Science has produced encouraging results.

The study, in the East Midlands, set out to develop an accurate way of forecasting where burglaries were most likely to occur. The experts likened their work to that of medical scientists who are able to plot the spread of communicable disease.

New software was developed to create what's known as prospective mapping – Promap for short. By the end of the trial Promap's success rate in predicting burglary hotspots had soared to 78%.

In publishing its findings the experts involved in the study were firmly of the view that this new approach to crime mapping represented "a step change" in fighting crime. There was a strong case for similar techniques to be used for mapping vehicle and violent crime, the report concludes. Throughout the six month trial, maps predicting the likely break-in hotspots were used operationally by East Midlands police. This enabled them to work out when and where to deploy resources.

The team of experts behind the study say predictive mapping and other hi-tech policing methods such as lab-on-a-chip forensic testing will give police out on patrol "real time information" to ensure they are in the right place at the right time.

But according to the report it could take 15 years to become a reality.

**From the 'Water Board'? - don't let them in!**

A high percentage of distraction burglaries and bogus callers claim to be from the 'water board'. Since 1989, when the Water Industry was privatised, the 'water board' no longer exists and employees and contractors from water companies should NOT use the term 'water board' when calling at your home.

One utility company which is doing more than most to educate communities and prevent doorstep crime is Severn Trent Water. There is now a real push to get the safety message across to Severn Trent Water's eight million customers in the Midlands. And that's where Leanne Town comes in. She was appointed to her new role this month to promote the password scheme, and is already making contact with Neighbourhood Watch groups, other community organisations and various agencies, such as the police and local authorities.

Leanne explained how it works: "We agree a password with the customer which remains secure. This password is known only to the customer and Severn Trent Water, and should not be given to anyone.

"For the scheme to work the customer must use the chain or keep the door closed and speak through the door when there is an unexpected caller at the door," she said. Once the customer has made it clear they have a password through the Severn Trent Water password scheme the representative will call a special number. Some key personal information needs to be relayed to the control centre "so we know they are genuine," explains Leanne.

Only then is the password information for that customer revealed to the Severn Trent Water employee on the doorstep. Finally, before letting them in, customers are told to check the representative's security card.

There will be a short delay while the representative contacts Severn Trent Water to obtain the password, and whilst security checks are undertaken. If the caller fails to return or you are at all suspicious then please contact your local police station immediately.

So far over 5,000 customers have signed up to the doorstep protection password scheme. Each customer also receives a window sticker to show that they are part of the scheme.

"The window sticker is an excellent deterrent in itself to any would-be bogus callers," said Leanne.

## Anti Social Behaviour

We have to advise that anti-social behaviour is still the biggest problem and we again ask people to let us know where and when it takes place. A lot of effort is being put into trying to solve this problem especially regarding alcohol so please support our Neighbourhood Team. Also, please be aware that there has been a spate of car crime developing in the area. It has moved off the Industrial Estates and coming into the residential area. We need to remind members to ensure nothing is left in their vehicles and they are all securely locked/garaged over night.

## Frosty Warning

LOCK it or lose it - that's the message from West Midlands Police as drivers are warned to take care of their vehicles during frosty mornings. The force has issued a warning to all motorists across the West Midlands at the start of this cold snap to beat car thieves at their own game by not leaving vehicles running while unattended. As the weather gets colder, some motorists become careless and leave keys in their ignitions as they warm their vehicles. Others leave the engine running in their parked vehicles as they go back inside the house and wait for their vehicle to de-ice. Inspector David Cotton, the force crime reduction officer, said: "The simple message from the police is do not leave a car running unattended for any length of time whether it is left on your own driveway to de-frost or to pop into a shop or post a letter.

"There are people who will steal if the opportunity presents itself and others who deliberately go in search of such opportunities - please do not give anyone the chance to steal your property."

Police have also urged motorists not to take any risks with their safety or the safety of others by clearing their windscreens properly before they drive.

## Apply now to the new Tax Refund Program

Please note that an e-mail purporting to be from HM Treasury, promising a tax refund, is doing the rounds. This is a scam, if you are eligible for a tax refund it will come from the Inland Revenue not the Treasury. DO NOT click on the link "Apply by clicking here".

## Callers At the Door.

We have recently had a couple of concerns raised about fund raisers from the RSPCA asking residents to fill in direct debit forms on their doorsteps, occasionally using 'hard sell' tactics which have left residents feeling intimidated. As this has happened in other areas the police have contacted the RSPCA who are understandably concerned. The company working on behalf of the RSPCA has also been contacted and warned that such practices will not be tolerated and any further complaints will be referred to Trading Standards. They have agreed to review their approach and will be informing the police regarding locations, dates, hours of operating, officers names, vehicles and license/permit details prior to any activity.

The police do not want to prevent the RSPCA (or any other legitimate charities) from raising funds, however we will not tolerate members of the community being intimidated in their homes. You are advised not to hand over bank details at the doorstep to cold callers. If you want to donate there are several ways of securely supplying your bank details, for example by post or secure internet connection.
